SF Paratransit



SF Paratransit, a service of the San Francisco Municipal Transportation Agency (SFMTA). The mission of SF Paratransit is to provide van and taxi services to people with disabilities, unable to independently use public transit due to a disability or disabling health condition. SF Paratransit performs nearly 800,000 passenger trips annually. Nearly two-thirds of all trips are provided by van operated services. The remaining third of the trips are provided by taxicabs. You are eligible to use paratransit services if you are unable to independently board, ride, or disembark from an accessible Muni bus, train, streetcar or BART train some or all of the time. If you feel you are unable to independently use Muni or BART some or all of the time due to a disability, you may request an application for ADA Paratransit service.

Phone the San Francisco Paratransit program at 351-7050. Your properly completed application will be processed within 21 days. If requested, you must make yourself available for a second-level assessment, and your medical professional must return the medical verification form within seven days of receipt.
